Daniel was rushed to the hospital in an unconscious state. Doctor recommended an immediate blood transfusion to save his life. Daniel's wife refused blood transfusion on him on the ground of his religious beliefs and he later died. In an action by Daniel's wife, Chams argued that Daniel would have survived if he had accepted the blood transfusion as recommended by the doctor and that his refusal has broken the chain of causation. Advise Daniel's wife.
